

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
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#### **Special Features:**


Some extras you shouldn't miss...

- The **Videos and Slideshows** located on the home page, provide short clips of some popular events and people and in American Indian History. These videos and slideshows are a great visual introduction into a lesson on a specific era or time period.
- "Curriculum Tools" located on the home page provide tools for students and educators from everything from writing a research paper to analyzing primary sources to citing sources and preventing plagiarism.
- Located on the home page under **"Key Primary Sources"** *"Key Court Cases"*, *"Important Treaties", "Landmark Legislation",* and *"Legends"* provide strong supporting documents for any research paper. Record information and tags help to further research on topic.

#### **Projects and Ideas for Educators – using American Indian History Online:**

American Indian History Online is a valuable starting point for student research papers and or projects. Here are a few projects where using American Indian History Online can be used to encourage learning and strengthen skills.

- Compare and Contrast...
  - Using the "Topic Centers" on the home page of American Indian History Online, compare and contrast the different culture areas. What are the similarities? What are the differences? Have students make a chart and compare several of the groups under each culture heading and give a presentation on their findings.
  - On the home page under "Key Maps and Graphs", check out the section under "Wars and Rebellions". Using *American Indian History Online*, research, compare and contrast some of the well-known battles (i.e. Battle of Little Bighorn; French and Indian Wars, etc....). Use this section for visuals and search for articles in the database. Ask students to use a visual (poster board, PowerPoint, etc....) and discuss the similarities and differences of these battles. What were the causes? What were the results?



- Create...
  - Using "Key People" on the Home page of American Indian History Online, choose a person in one of the categories and read a few articles about them, (Artists and Craftspeople, Explorers, Political Leaders and Activists, Spiritual and Religious Leaders, War Leaders, etc..). Have students create a poster or bio-page about that person and use bullets to highlight interesting facts.
  - ✓ Have students choose and event from the *American Indian History Online* database and write an article as if the event appeared on the front page of an old newspaper.

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#### • Critical Thinking and Discussion...

- ✓ Under "Key Primary Sources" on the home page, have students choose "Legends" and read some of these folktales. Ask students to research in *American Indian History Online*, about the history of myths, legends and folklore. Choose a legend and start a class discussion asking students what they think about particular legends and how they came to be. Discuss tradition and how traditions are formed and how they affect the family unit as we know it.
- ✓ Using "Videos and Slideshows" on the home page, choose the video "Native Americans' Use of Symbols," and watch the video in class or assign it for

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viewing for homework. Discuss the different lifestyles of each of the cultures and how they used symbols to communicate.

✓ Using "Key People" on the home page, go to "Political Leaders and Activists". Ask students to choose one of the people labeled "Activist." Have students write a short essay about what that person is noted for and how he or she impacted the American Indian culture. How did their quest help American Indians today or historically?

#### Visual Learning- How effective are databases and video in learning?

Online resources are a great way to promote and improve learning. They help to stimulate the thought process and allow students to understand a concept, idea or process, with visual input. Did you know...?

- ✓ Approximately 65 % of the population are visual learners
- ✓ The brain processes visual information 60,000 times faster than text.
- ✓ 90% of information that comes to the brain is visual.
- ✓ Visual aids in the classroom improve learning by up to 400%.
- ✓ A stimulating environment for a child can make the difference between a 25% greater ability to learn or 25% less in an environment with little stimulation.
